FAQ: EcoFaith Recovery

EcoFaith Recovery is an ecumenical leadership development effort through which volunteer leaders lift one another up to equip our congregations to take courageous public action for the recovery of human life and the healing of God's Creation.



Q: How does EcoFaith Recovery do this work?

A: By engaging with one another in a set of recovery practices. Our *Practices for Awakening Leadership* include spiritual grounding, relational conversations, telling our stories, rhythms of engagement, mentoring and conscious leadership development.

Q: What has EcoFaith Recovery done?

A: With your support and the efforts of our volunteer leaders we have....

- *Engaged* over 90 existing and emerging leaders in the *Practices for Awakening Leadership* through independent practice groups, congregational teams, and a seven-session *Coming Home to Earth* course with Pastor Mark Brocker of St. Andrew Lutheran Church;
- *Offered* a new course developed and led by two of our interns and attended by 15 people of faith: *Columbia River Watershed Discipleship: Faith and the Ecology of Liberation*;
- *Provide*d monthly Grounding for Action Beyond Fossil Fuels gatherings since August 2013. Attended by over 120 people from a wide range of congregations and other community groups, this Initiative partners with organizing efforts like Leaven Community and 350PDX to build and deepen relationships for power and action;
- *Supported* 175 leaders and their congregations through online forums to network with one another in our efforts to bring healing to our communities and God's creation;
- *Developed* the leadership potential of 16 stipended youth and young adult interns through special projects mentored by experienced volunteer leaders. One intern developed a new EcoFaith Youth Camp; another created EcoFaith videos to inspire people to engage in caring for God's creation; and one teenager worked on a sustainable farm to integrate values of sustainability with his Native American culture and spirituality.

Q: Does EcoFaith Recovery have full time staff?

A: No, EcoFaith Recovery relies on its volunteer leaders and networks to carry out its work. We have very part-time staffing that supports our volunteer leaders in living out their vision.

Q: What's EcoFaith Recovery's budget and what does it support?

A: Our modest \$70,000 per year budget provides the staff and virtual office systems through which we connect new leaders with EcoFaith Recovery, communicate the vision of our leaders with the larger community, provide the online tools our leaders need to coordinate and network with one another, and offer the administrative support needed so *our leaders are free to engage each other and their congregations in taking courageous action for the recovery of human life and healing of God's creation.*

Q: Who funds EcoFaith Recovery?

A: We receive a \$25,000 grant from the InFaith Community Foundation each year. To fund the rest of our \$70,000 budget, we depend upon direct financial support from our volunteers, supporters, and congregations, to live out our vision of faith-inspired healing and recovery for the entire earth community.
